You can use a gray
pencil to add
shadows to your
white flowers but if
you were doing this in
watercolor you would
mix your gray either
from complements or
by using the three



primaries-red, yellow and blue. Your gray could be made warm or cool depending on how much you used of each mix. You can do the same in colored pencil and make your grays much more interesting.

- Use pastel or light versions of the colors you are mixingpink and a soft green, blue slate and a pale orange, lilac and yellow.
  - Write down the names of the pencils your use!
- ❖ Try Violets or blue- grays with peachy colors like Prismacolor Peach or Nectar. This is one of my favorite combinations.
- Start with a gray pencil and add color to it to make it warmer (red, yellow, orange) or cooler (blue, green).
- ❖ Use different color combinations in different places on your painting depending on how the light is falling. All your shadows do not need to be the same.
