

Colored Pencil Supply List ~

Bring a flower or plant or leaves to draw and share. I will bring what is in my garden.

Drawing paper, Bristol Vellum 300, 11 x 14, or similar of good quality.

Kneaded eraser. Also recommended -the Tombow Mono Round eraser for graphite drawing.

Graphite drawing pencils, H or HB

I highly recommend the Rapesco 64 available on Amazon or a handheld sharpener.

Colored Pencils:

Good **quality** colored pencils (**Prismacolors**, Lyra Rembrandt, **Faber-Castell**, Caran d'Ache Pablos or Luminance) (Crayola or Prang are hard and will **not** give you good color.) I recommend buying pencils **individually**. Faber-Castell has an inexpensive student line called Goldfaber with the same color # as below. **Buy what you can get and afford.**

I will bring pencils to share.

If you already own watercolor pencils bring them along.

103 Ivory	White (best white to own)
Light, colors ~ pinks, lavenders, light colors in Spring	Grayed Lavender (good for white or yellow flowers)
Ochres, Sienna Brown in Autumn and Winter
